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New Delhi: Payments made by the government into people's bank accounts through Direct Benefit Transfer(DBT) havecrossed z1 lakh crore in thisfinancial year. Thegovernment is expected to announce soon that it has saved almost 275,000 crorethroughDBT since2014.
DBTpayoutfigurestoodat 1 1,00,144 croreon Wednesday, upfrom $₹ 74,707$ crore in 2016-17 and ₹7,367 crore in 2013-14, when the UPA was inpower. A senior government official told ET the final DBT payout for 2017-18 couldreach ₹1.2lakh crore, a60\% a

Over 63 crore people have received DBT payments for programmes including rural jobs and subsidised cooking gas in this financial year, against 35 crore last year, implying that every second person in the country now gets benefits from the government directly, without any middlemen or leakage, the official said. Only 10 crore people were covered by DBT when the Modi governmenttook over in May 2014.

The savings figure, however, has been attacked by the opposition and activists who claim it is grossly inflated. The increase has been effected by the government's attempt to bring all central schemes-about 450 of them-under DBT's ambitby March. While 142 central schemes were covered under DBT in the previous financial year, there are currently 412 programmes.
The biggest payout this financial year, as in earlier years, was ₹28,623 crore under MGNREGS. The government paid $₹ 20,610$ crore asLPG subsidy, ₹10,042 croreunder various scholarship schemes and ₹5,831 crore through the National Social Assistance Programme. An amount of $₹ 34,917$ crore was paid under various otherschemes.
